

White shuts down reporter at pre-fight presser White shuts down reporter at pre-fight presser Getty Images

Neither Canelo nor Terence Crawford generated the headlines at Thursday's press conference, however. Instead it was Dana White who dominated the next morning's newspapers after he lashed out at a reporter who dared to question him about changes to the Muhammad Ali Act.

White heads up the American mixed martial arts (MMA) promotion

company the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) and has long been open about his interest in moving into boxing.

There are key differences between MMA and boxing, however. In MMA, the UFC administers its own fighter rankings and world championships, but this is not allowed in boxing due to the Ali Act, a 2000 US law designed to protect boxers and combat potential monopolies.

White is supportive of proposals to change the Ali Act — which he was asked about by boxing reporter Sean Zittel. But White responded angrily, accusing Zittel of "showboating".

"This is obviously a long discussion. If you want to talk about that then set up an interview. This isn't about me," White said. White then interrupted Zittel's reply, adding: "You have a question for these two, no? Beat it."

Terence Crawford has meanwhile embraced being the underdog and has spent much of this week telling reporters that he is ready to "shock the world" by defeating Canelo.

Crawford also said on Thursday that he was interested in "helping the sport of boxing to grow" by taking a risk and jumping up in weight to fight one of the world's best.

"I'm feeling great and I'm ready to go out and shock the world," he said.

He added: "Fights like this help the sport of boxing grow, in the sense of having the best fight the best. It ain't gonna do nothing but

make the sport better."

And when asked why he believed he was going to win today, he replied: "The only thing he probably can beat me in is horseback riding — because I don't ride horses. But anything else, he don't come close."

In truth the 21-year-old did little to catch the eye in his first four bouts, but he was very impressive last time out, dispatching the

Indian journeyman Yumnam Santosh Singh in the first round.

Serhii Bohachuk (26-2) will today have the opportunity to avenge his surprise 2021 defeat by Brandon Adams (25-4) as the Ukrainian continues to move back into world title contention after coming up short against Vergil Ortiz Jr last year.

Their first fight, held in Puerto Rico under COVID-19 restrictions, was a thriller, with Adams down on all three scorecards before he stunned Bohachuk with a counter left hook late in the eighth en route to handing him the first defeat of his professional career.

"This a rematch of a badass fight with these two," White said on Instagram Live when announcing this fight. "Literally, Adams had to win the fight by knockout. And he did."

The pressure is well and truly on Bohachuk after he last month succeeded with an appeal to the WBC to reinstate him to number one in its super-welterweight rankings, after Jaron 'Boots' Ennis was

parachuted in above him.

Win today and Bohachuk could find himself with a second title shot.

The heavyweight clash between the Kazakh Ivan Dychko (15-0) and Michigan-native Jermaine Franklin Jr (23-2) is the first true fight of the evening and definitely one to keep an eye on later.

Dychko has had something of a frustrating professional career, despite assembling a respectable 15-0 record.

The 35-year-old, who won bronze at the 2012 and 2016 Olympic Games and beat both Filip Hrgovic and Zhilei Zhang as an amateur, has struggled to find opponents in the pro ranks and has fought just six times in the last six years.

Tonight he's facing the toughest test of his professional career to date as he comes up against the experienced Franklin, who is unbeaten on American soil but lost against both Dillian Whyte and Anthony Joshua in the UK.
